The AFA degree in **Foundation Studio Art** requires 103 - 106 quarter credits in courses numbered 100 or above and a cumulative GPA of 2.0 or higher. Students granted the degree meet all of the requirements of the Washington State Direct Transfer Agreement (DTA) and can expect some priority in admission as a transfer student to most Washington State four-year institutions as a major in Fine Arts. Portfolio presentation is usually the determining factor in acceptance for a Fine Arts Major, and this degree provides the structure for the preparation of a strong portfolio.

Students interested in pursuing the AFA degree should contact an Art advisor at the beginning of their program of study.
